Women's Pioneer Event

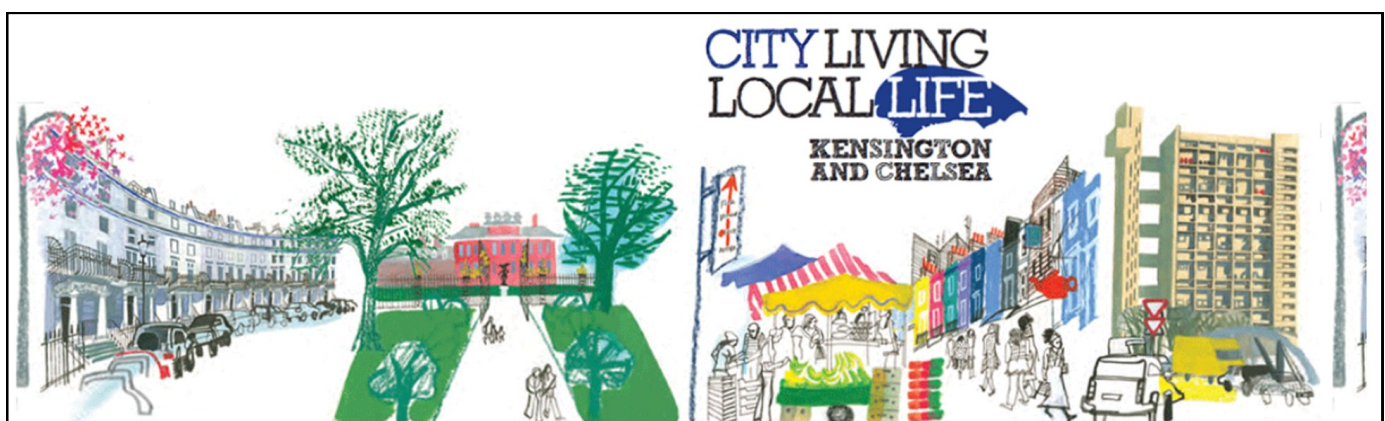

The Earls Court Tardis

Giving a new lease of life to the portal of space and time

In a drive to improve the local built environment of Earl's Court, the ward's Councillors awarded Spear Mews Residents Association a grant through the City Living, Local Life programme to give the well-known and much photographed blue police box 'Tardis' at the entrance of Earl's Court underground station a facelift. However, the award was not simply about revitalising street furniture. The project also gave the blue box a new purpose. It will now have a part time resident, an Earl's Court PC using the box as a base a few times a week to ensure a visible presence within the local community and to host residents who would like to take up the offer of 'Cuppa with a Copper'.



Other projects supported by City Living, Local Life Earl's Court in the last year include the community event held by An-Nisa Women's Empowerment Group to celebrate International Women's Day; equipment for Solidarity Sports, a local charity that offers local children the opportunity to take part in sports that they would not otherwise be able to afford; and the refurbishment of St Cuthberts Church's community space.



A Message From The Community Safety Team: Burglary in the borough is up

More homes are being burgled in the borough, with a greater variety of properties being targeted by criminals. Figures from the Metropolitan Police Service show that residential burglary in the Royal Borough rose to 971 in the 12 months to December 2015.

The wards that suffered most over the past year were Pembridge, Colville, Royal Hospital, Courtfield, Golborne and Redcliffe. The borough as a whole is ranked the fifth worst in inner London and tenth across the whole of the capital for residential burglaries.

The Council's Community Safety Team is committed to reducing this crime in the borough and has worked with the police on tactics known as target hardening and cocooning to drive down the numbers. Target hardening means using physical and/or electronic security devices to protect vulnerable premises that have either been burgled or repeatedly burgled or fall within a current residential burglary hotspot. Cocooning, involves police officers visiting people living near the victims of burglaries within 24 hours to offer crime prevention advice designed to prevent them becoming the next target.

Burglaries can be prevented by taking simple precautions. Landlords, homeowners and tenants are encouraged to get the recommended security works carried out within three to six weeks to ensure a repeat incident does not occur, while the Community Safety Team funds or part funds the recommended security works through a discretionary security grant.

Antisocial Drivers Face Fines

As the noisy, antisocial supercar season approaches the Royal Borough is reminding visitors and residents of the powers it now has to combat antisocial motoring in Knightsbridge. Since the introduction of a Public Spaces Protection Order (PSPO) last December drivers of any vehicles in the Knightsbridge area can be fined for:

- Revving engines;
- Repeated sudden or rapid acceleration;
- Racing;
- Leaving the engine running while parked;
- Performing stunts;
- Sounding horns;
- Playing Music;
- Using offensive language and/or intimidating behaviour towards others;
- Causing obstruction on a public highway, including driving in convoy;

Anyone found breaching the PSPO will face a fine of between £100 and £1,000 for each offence.

The PSPO is enforced between noon and 6am and fines can be issued by Council officers or the police. If residents in the Knightsbridge area notice a vehicle breaching the order they can call the Council on **020 7361 3002** or email pspo@rbkc.gov.uk with the following information:

- Where did the breach occur?;
- What time did the breach occur?;
- Which of the criteria from the PSPO were breached?;
- What was the make, model and colour of the vehicle?;
- What is the vehicle registration number?;
- If possible can you provide a description of the driver or passengers?;
- Are you prepared to provide a witness statement? (We cannot pursue a case unless this is provided);
